- 1. Comfort During Crisis: While we often think about packing survival essentials in our emergency kits, recent events have shown us how much a few items of comfort can mean during a stressful situation. For children, a coloring book, toy, or stuffed animal might help calm their anxiety. For adults, consider packing playing cards, small board games, a musical instrument, or a few books to help to pass the time.
- 2. Chat About It: A major earthquake may cause cell phone towers to stop working or become overloaded. Where will you meet if you are separated from your family or housemates when a major earthquake hits? What might you need to keep in your car to get there? Suggested items for your car emergency kit might include a map of your local area, sun protection, and sturdy closed-toed walking shoes.
- 3. What if an earthquake occurs while you are asleep? Secure a bag of earthquake essentials next to your bed. It might include shoes (to walk across broken glass), a second pair of prescription eye-glasses, a bottle of water, a flashlight, a radio, a few doses of essential medications, and heavy duty gloves to remove hazards.
- 4. Desert Preparedness: A basic emergency kit is a great start, but you may need additional items if you live in the desert. Consider adding a battery-powered fan, widebrim hats, sunscreen, sun-protective clothing, a sun umbrella, an outdoor sunshade, and a lot of extra water to your emergency kit. While water supply recommendations vary, it is ideal to have at least a two-week supply of water on hand for the people and pets of your household. For the desert climate, experts suggest four gallons per person, per day.
- 5. Pet Preparedness: Pets are part of our families, so make sure to prepare them for an emergency too! You can use the pet emergency checklist featured here! <u>https://www.cdc.gov/healthypets/resources/disaster-prep-pet-emergency-checklist.pdf</u>
